



The acquisition of the St-Aubin Innovation Space site means that the canton of Fribourg now has ample land (100 hectares) and the necessary infrastructure to host the winners of the Agri & Co Challenge.

It is perhaps not surprising that the canton of Fribourg, a major player in the Swiss agrofood sector, has launched the Agri & Co Challenge, an ambitious international call for projects targeted at businesses in the food, agriculture and biomass industries. "The canton of Fribourg will use the Agri & Co Challenge to expand its network of innovative and sustainable firms, foster synergies between different economic sectors, and introduce new value chains, especially with emerging markets", explains Olivier Curty, the Cantonal Minister of Economic Affairs. The Agri & Co Challenge judging panel will include representatives from leading industry names – and initiative partners - Nestlé, Cremo, fenaco and Micarna.

Winners of the Agri & Co Challenge can choose from one of two options: "Relocation" and "Remote cooperation". Under the first option, winning companies will be offered premises free

of charge for two years at the St-Aubin Innovation Space. They will also each receive a cash prize of CHF 30 000, as well as bespoke mentoring and coaching. As for the second option, winning companies that do not wish to relocate but are nonetheless interested in breaking into the Swiss market are given the opportunity to find out more about the agrofood ecosystem in the canton of Fribourg and Switzerland generally, with a view to forging long-term partnerships with local stakeholders.

The 15 most promising projects will share prize money of almost CHF 500,000. The closing date for applications is 31 May 2018. The winners will be announced on 7 November 2018 during the official Canton of Fribourg Innovation Award ceremony.

Established in 1979, Liebherr Machines Bulle Ltd (LMB) has become one of the canton's iconic companies. With a 1,350-strong workforce, LMB specialises in the development and manufacture of diesel and gas engines, fuel injection systems, hydraulic components and splitter boxes. Joint interview with Claude Ambrosini and Dr. Thomas Kunze, members of the management board.

Why Switzerland, and more specifically Fribourg?

Claude Ambrosini. Dr. Hans Liebherr (ed.: who founded the eponymous group in 1949) love the Gruyère region and regularly stayed here. The arrival of the motorway between the late 1970s and 1980s meant that the idea of building a factory in Bulle was no longer impractical. Of course, there were the favourable tax conditions too, but that was not the deal breaker: Mr. Liebherr enjoyed a genuine relationship of trust with Gaston Dupasquier, the then mayor of Bulle. The handshake between the two men to seal the deal was long and heartfelt. Dr. Liebherr realised that he had just set up a company in a region whose people reminded him so much of his fellow Swabians. Switzerland's great economic and political stability was also a decisive factor, as was the magnificent view that the site enjoys over the Fribourg Prealps! I could well imagine that Mr. Liebherr's children marvelled at the stunning landscape which greeted them every morning when they opened their shutters!



Thomas Kunze is head of the R&D department of Liebherr Machines Bulle, a world leader in the manufacture of combustion engines and hydraulic

Mr. Kunze, can you tell us a little about yourself?

Dr. Thomas Kunze. I was born in Saxony, in East Germany. At the time of German reunification, in 1989, I was studying in Dresden. I remember it as an extremely tense and emotionally charged period. For close to 20 years, I held a number of senior-level posts with an international company specialising in the manufacture of hydraulic components. In 2014, I had the opportunity of joining LMB, a company whose long-term vision when it comes to technology, quality and customer satisfaction greatly appeals to me.

After four years living and working here, what do you think about the region?

Dr. T. K. My wife and I really enjoy living here. We got to know our neighbours very quickly, and we have made friends here. There is a lot of kindness and goodwill about. [...]



Clearly, Jean-Pierre Geneslay, the Managing Director of Chocolat Villars, is incredibly proud of his company's Swiss heritage. In 2017, Villars launched a new range of chocolate bars made from milk specially sourced from the cantons of Fribourg, Bern and Lucerne. As he explains with gusto, "Each region has its own unique qualities: the milk from Lucerne is full-bodied and velvety, the milk from Bern is smooth and milky, while milk from Fribourg is creamy with a hint of caramel. Like this, we make sure that each chocolate bar has its own distinct flavour!"

The milk from Fribourg is sourced by Cremo, the chocolate-maker's partner in this venture, from a total of 60 local farms and, for the first time, is 100% traceable. The beet sugar, too, is also

produced and processed in Switzerland. The same applies to the finest Poire Williams, kirsch, absinthe, whisky and gin that go into Villars' new range of liqueur chocolates. "These projects were two years in development. We sought input from historians, visited alpine farms, and met with producers and other contributors. This is all part of our eternal mission to showcase Swiss quality, remain an important player in the local economy, and help safeguard traditional know-how. The next challenge Villars has set for itself is to share this incredible expertise with the rest of the world. "We already export our 350 chocolate varieties to more than 60 countries around the globe. And if the positive feedback from our distributors is anything to go by, our philosophy of using only 100% Swiss premium products and traditions is paying dividends!"

SAFE AND EFFECTIVE (1)

"Most of what we do is invisible to the naked eye", notes Ines Najorka, Communications Director at COMET. That is an understatement. The company, which is based in Flamatt, is among the world's leading providers of solutions that make our lives safer and better. "Because even minute defects can have a major impact on product safety, we have developed x-ray solutions that make objects 200 times thinner than a single human hair." COMET's x-ray and CT (computed tomography) technologies help to detect flaws in components for the electronics, aeronautical and automotive industries. They are also a common feature in airports,

where they are used to inspect aviation pipelines and screen baggage. Likewise, for surfaces that have been treated using the company's e-Beam technology, the results are imperceptible. Thanks to Comet's solutions, the famous Tetra beverage cartons, for example, are now sterilised by electron beam not harmful chemicals. This process has led to a 40% drop in $\rm CO_2$ emissions and slashed energy consumption by half. Comet's third core technology is radio frequency, which is used in the manufacture of memory chips and sensors.

"A real culture of trust": according to Regula Sandi, Corporate Communication Manager at Scout24, is this phrase which best sums up the philosophy of Switzerland's leading online marketplace. BIOFACTORY COMPETENCE CENTER/PALL CORPORATION

JOINING FORCES TO LAUNCH UNIQUE FACILITY

Fribourg's bioFactory Competence Center (BCC) has joined force with US firm Pall Corporation to launch a unique continuous bioprocessing facility in Fribourg, according to the Director of the BCC, Professor Ian Marison. "Pall is a world leader in continuous bioprocessing and has supplied the BCC with all the equipment", Marison explained. "We have worked together with Pall for the last two years and have designed a range of training courses for Pall and their clients." Next year, the BCC will initiate a series of public training courses that will focus on continuous bioprocessing for making biopharmaceutical compounds.

"With continuous processing, as soon as some material has completed a given step it can be moved to the

next step", said Gareth Leach, Vice President of Global Product Marketing and European Regional Marketing at Pall Life Sciences in Fribourg. "It's more efficient, faster and improves the level of control and reduces the footprint of a facility. The industry, historically, is accustomed to producing "batch" wise, so the idea of the BCC courses is to help bring an understanding of continuous processing into the open", Leach added. One advantage of continuous bioprocessing is that factories can be a lot smaller, which lowers manufacturing costs. "I think production costs could potentially be up to five times cheaper this way, not least because the capital investment needed to build a factory is considerably reduced", Marison said. The products made can include biopharmaceuticals designed

to improve the quality of life regarding the treatment of cancers, autoimmune diseases, and neurological diseases, such as Alzheimer's.

The process also boosts productivity, according to Marison. "Continuous bioprocessing offers a much higher productivity, with reduced material costs, which potentially makes it possible to produce 10 times as much product in the same time. Most current reactors are up to 20,000 litres in scale but with a continuous system it should be possible with a 2,000 litre one."

PARTICLE VISION

DUST DETECTIVES

Already widely used in forensics, the analytical methods used by the Fribourg firm Particle Vision is a world first in the field. "In some ways, you could say we are dust detectives", explains Juanita Rausch, Co-Director of the company based in the Fri Up business incubator. The experts at Particle Vision, however, go much further. Using an extremely powerful microscope, they are even able to distinguish the particle type and determine their provenance. "There are over 200 fundamental types of particle." As a result, it

is also now possible to assess, with great precision, the impact that these particles have on our quality of life. "Take pollen, for example. Even when there is much of it in the air, the only real health risk that comes with it is an allergic reaction. However, the same can definitely not be said of heavy metal particles, which are often emitted by road traffic!"

SUSTAINABLE LEADERSHIP



Quality of life begins at home. Take swisspor, the leading provider of insulation and waterproofing solutions in Switzerland: it is constantly striving to develop products that reduce the amount of energy buildings use. The group's new facility in Châtel-St-Denis (see photograph) manufactures advanced polyurethane insulating panels. As Laurent Caillère, Marketing and Communications Director, explains:

"Our products offer considerably more added-value than those of our rivals", adding "We manufacture a total of 300,000 m³ of panelling every year. In addition, swisspor also has the highest number of products (in excess of 100) of any insulation manufacturer in Switzerland carrying the eco-bau "eco" label. This is not the only example of the group's sustainable leadership: since 2013, all of its six manufacturing

facilities in Switzerland are powered by 100% green electricity generated from renewable sources. Furthermore, the roofs of the two facilities in Fribourg are fitted with around 15,000 m² photovoltaic panels, effectively making them the largest solar plant in the canton.

SWISS LIVING CHALLENGE

WINNER OF THE 2017 SOLAR © DECATHLON IN DENVER COLORADO

The U.S. Energy Department Solar Decathlon brings together thousands of students, in pursuit of the same goal: to design and build a perfectly functional, full-sized, energy-efficient, solar-powered home. The Swiss team that took part in the 2017 competition, held in Denver (Colorado), swept all before them. In the eight contests out of a possible 10 that they entered, they took first place in six before being crowned the undisputed winner. You could say, they nailed it!

The prize-winning NeighborHub was the brainchild of a group of over 250 students from the Ecole Polytechnique Fédérale de Lausanne (EPFL), the Fribourg School of Engineering and Architecture (HEIA-FR), the Geneva School of Art and Design (HEAD) and the University of Fribourg, and was two years in development. The judging panel was won over by their bold and innovative idea for a modular community centre. As a delighted Anne-Claude Cosandey, Operational Director of the EPFL Fribourg and member of the Swiss Living Challenge

executive committee explains: "The win is a fitting reward for a multidisciplinary team that included four higher education institutions, 250 students, 43 of whom travelled to Denver, 150 supervisors from academia and industry, as well some 50 institutional and private partners."

In autumn 2018, the NeighborHub will open at Fribourg's blueFACTORY innovation quarter and, in keeping with the students' original mission, will become a fully working community centre. "The structure will be used for research and demonstration purposes by the Smart Living Lab, our ambitious centre of expertise on the homes of tomorrow", adds Cosandey.

FRIBOURG FIRMS RISE TO THE CHALLENGE

The size of the Swiss Living Challenge project required first-rate coordination. To this end, nine students took over responsibility for coordinating activities in fields as varied as engineering, architecture, external communication and general management. Baptiste Gex, from the EPFL, was in charge of relations with private partners. "The project received a lot of positive feedback from the firms that supported it in a variety of ways, whether through funding, materials, supervision or coaching." Some of these private backers are more than happy to share their story: "Working with the academic community was a very positive experience. It was a great pleasure to be part of such an innovative project and to share in the students' infectious enthusiasm", notes Jean-Marc Ducret, Managing Director of JPF-Ducret. The Fribourg company lent the team a helping hand by constructing the building's timber frame, particularly the machining of the prefabricated components. Same story from Riedo Clima, which shared

its plumbing expertise: "Students were really interested and totally immersed in the project. We were really impressed at how quickly they absorbed and applied the instructions the professionals gave them. Also, we had a very amicable and constructive working relationship", notes Florim Ademi, project manager at Riedo Clima. The company Portes Brodard developed and produced fixed and moving components for the façade of NeighborHub, as per the students' specifications and principles. "For the doors, we developed a manual gas-spring assisted system, making it completely energy-independent. The pre-assembled system meant that students were able to install it simply and quickly. They were so enthusiastic, and both I and the company learnt a great deal from them!", explains Yves Gremaud, special projects manager at Portes Brodard. Finally, Groupe E lent a helping hand when it came to energy efficiency, technical equipment, and the installation of solar

panels, power connections and electrical appliances. "Besides the educational aspect of the project, this partnership was an opportunity to explore a number of issues surrounding the challenges we face in the future, such as self-generation, neighbours trading energy among themselves and energy storage sharing. We have already started to give some serious thought to these rapidly-evolving issues", explains Alain Sapin, Director of the Electrical Energy Department at Groupe E. "NeighborHub could become a lifesize laboratory where we can test and evaluate these various decentralised production and distribution models."



FRIENDLY WORK SPACE FOR A ULTICULTURAL TEAM



Who doesn't enjoy a massage? Well, luckily for Micarna's 1,400 employees in Courtepin, they can treat themselves to an on-site massage, completely free of charge. Micarna is one of the largest meat producers in Switzerland, selling its wares primarily to the large food retailer Migros, but to several other companies, too. "The work is physically demanding because it involves moving heavy loads around, often in cold conditions", explains Véronique Rolle, HR Director at Micarna. "This is why we have long made health promotion a priority, and we now work with specially trained ergonomics coaches." The number of physical ailments among the workforce has fallen dramatically and occupational safety is even better than before. Nonetheless, Micarna is not content to rest on its laurels. The next issue it has pledged to tackle is psychological stress. Unsurprisingly, the company has been officially named a "Friendly Work Space". This label is awarded to employers who have shown outstanding commitment to workplace health management.

This is not the only award bestowed on the company. It also received the canton of Fribourg's "Migration and Employment" prize for its Maflü programme. Devised in response to the refugee crisis, Maflü was a pilot project aimed at offering refugees an opportunity to gain work experience. This is followed up with work placements,

language courses and pre-apprenticeships. "Within the next couple of years, our first intake of refugees is set to complete their apprenticeships with us", Rolle notes. Micarna has since made the pilot a permanent programme, and former refugees are now part of a workforce that boasts some 70 nationalities. "A major factor in its success has been the excellent collaboration we enjoy with the canton."


At Micarna, apprentices are also given a great deal of responsibility early on, "As part of our Mazubi programme, they run their own firm within the larger Micarna operation, which includes managing the budget, turnover and quality control." The trainees, though, are by no means the sole beneficiaries, "Our apprentices have been behind the launch of a host of innovative products. Every year, the new hires arrive with their own set of fresh ideas!"

It is not only the apprentices, refugees and the workforce in general who reap the rewards of Micarna's commitment and dedication. Consumers benefit from great-tasting, quality products, too.

CANTONAL UNIVERSITY, GLOBAL REACH

Founded 130 years ago, the University of Fribourg is an integral part of life in the canton. By actively strengthening cohesion between the fields of economics, politics, culture, science and religion, this august institution helps to sustain the high quality of life that Fribourg offers its citizens. What is more, the sphere of influence of a number of its institutes extends well beyond Switzerland. A case in point is the International Institute of Management in Technology (iimt), which offers excellent continuing education programmes (MBA, CAS), as Astrid Epiney, the University's Rector, points out. "The iimt works closely with firms in the technology sector, such as Swisscom (telecommunications), Groupe E (energy) and banks." Fribourg University is also active on the policy front through its Institute of Federalism, a think tank on all matters related to this partic-

ular political system. Its work also includes advising foreign governments and NGOS. Professor Epiney adds, "It is not about exporting the Swiss model. Federalism is a highly adaptable concept that can be fashioned in a multitude of different ways." Another area of specialisation is multilingualism. It somewhat makes perfect sense that a university based in a region where Frenchand German-speaking communities live side by side would have a particular interest in the cultural dimensions of multilingual settings. "The Institute of Multilingualism is considered a national centre of excellence", carrying out basic research and advising on identity and cultural issues.

The Swiss Centre for Islam Society focuses on the role that faith plays in forging the identity of a section of the Swiss population. Its mandate, conferred by the Swiss Confeder-

ation, is to analyse how individuals can live out their Muslim faith while upholding the rules of a constitutional state like Switzerland. In doing so, the Centre fosters mutual respect as well as the cohesion of a society in which different religions and beliefs coexist. Astrid Epiney welcomes this move, "The Centre helps to prevent a particular section of the community becoming marginalised. Ultimately, everyone, as well as the economy, will reap the benefits of the resulting stability." The jewel in the University's scientific crown is the Adolphe Merkle Institute (go to page 37 to read more about its Director). Established 10 years ago, this centre of research in nanotechnologies, the only one of its kind in Switzerland, is considered among the best in the world, and works very closely with industry.


WHERE BUSINESS AND © GOVERNMENT WORK IN HARMONY






Mathieu Jaton's schedule is as full as that of any head of state. "Two days ago, I was at the opening of the Comptoir gruérien (November 2017). Tomorrow, I'm heading off to Japan." SLAVA BYKOV

THE FRIBOURG LEGEND WHO CAME IN FROM THE COLD



Catching a HC Fribourg-Gottéron game in the BCF Arena is a must for many locals.

He had his pick of NHL teams, but it was Fribourg where the Russian ice-hockey star Slava Bykov decided to park his skates in 1990. "The fall of the Berlin Wall and the opening up of Russia's political system meant that professional athletes were finally able to take up opportunities abroad. "I was approached by prestigious Northern American clubs, but in the end I put my family first: if I played outside of Europe, I would have to spend a lot of time travelling back and forth, and be away from home for long periods." So, five-time world champion and Olympic gold medal winner, Viatcheslav (Slava) Bykov plumped for Switzerland, "which I really liked when I was here in the 1980s playing in competitive matches". He signed with the "Dragons" of Gottéron, and soon his wife and their two young children joined him in Fribourg. So began a love affair "both professionally and personally" between the man from Chelyabinsk and the canton. For seven years, he sported the number 90 jersey of Fribourg Gottéron, and together with his fellow countryman, Andrei Khomutov, made up an unforgettable double act.

The love affair between Bykov and Fribourg endured long after he left the Dragons, initially to play with Lausanne Hockey Club, before going on to coach CSKA Moscow and the Russian national team. "I am someone who is very loyal. Why should I move if I am happy where I am?" His children went to school in the canton. Now grown up, his son Andrei is a star player with Fribourg Gottéron. It was also in the canton, more precisely in Marly, where Bykov obtained his Swiss passport in 2004. Almost 30 years since he arrived, he considers himself "a real Dzodzet" (patois word for a man from Fribourg)". He is particularly touched by the attachment that the people of Fribourg have for traditions, "I love the village fêtes, fairs and Bénichon (ed.: harvest festival)." When his friends and family come to visit, he always takes them out to sample local specialities. Above all, though, "I love giving them a glimpse into my day-to-day life, letting them breathe in the Fribourg air: it's really quite something!"

As well as the landscape "which is surprisingly untouched for such a

highly-developed region", it is the traditional local produce that really gets her pulse racing. She firmly believes that it is precisely in food production that the sustainable development potential of the canton lies, "As both a farming region and an incubator of innovative start-ups, Fribourg has what it takes to become a centre of excellence in this field!"





"As soon as celebrities touch down in Fribourg to attend one of its festivals, they immediately lose their airs and graces and become down-to-earth and likeable... just like the people of Fribourg themselves!" It may be seven years since Thierry Jobin took over the reins of the Fribourg International Film Festival (FIFF), but he remains pretty awestruck by the unaffected and collegial atmosphere that permeates the canton's cultural scene, something he had never experienced before. Clearly, it also rubs off on the foreign artists who travel to the canton. According to the FIFF Artistic Director, "All the cultural institutions pull together". So, it is not uncommon to see the directors of various cultural events dining out together to discuss a new joint project. "Major projects take no more than two to


three months to get off the ground here. This would be inconceivable anywhere else."

Not surprisingly, this collaborative environment is reflected in the canton's packed festival calendar. As well as the FIFF, every year Fribourg plays host to a wide range of acclaimed cultural events, including Les Francomanias (music), Belluard Bollwerk International (contemporary arts), Murten Classics (classical music), Les Georges (music), les Rencontres de folklore internationales (traditional dance and music from around the world) and Bad Bonn Kilbi (alternative rock). Every time he travels to other prestigious film festivals abroad, the lasting impression that the FIFF has on visiting directors and actors never ceases to amaze him, "At the

last Busan International Film Festival in South Korea, every single person I met who had previously attended the FIFF wanted to share cherished memories of their time in Fribourg, where in some cases they had met for the first time." That is the magic of Fribourg: a closeness that helps bring people together and fosters dialogue.

TOUGH ON OOD SAFETY



Eating healthily is a good thing but knowing where the food on your plate comes from is even better! As Jacques Bourgeois, the head of the Swiss Farmers' Union, explains, locally sourced, quality produce is extremely important to the people and the authorities of Fribourg, just as it is elsewhere in Switzerland. The man from Fribourg takes food safety very seriously: "A whole raft of measures has been introduced to make sure that food products are unimpeachable and of high added value." Consequently, Swiss farmers have to comply with some of the most stringent regulations in the world – environmental compatibility, animal welfare, ban on GMOs, economical use of crop protection products and antibiotics, to name but a few. As the National Councillor readily admits, total food self-sufficiency in Switzerland is illusory. Nonetheless, foodstuffs should be sourced from domestic producers, wherever possible. "In Switzerland, every second food product is made here. Given demographic trends and the growing scarcity of natural resources, the challenge will be maintaining the status quo."

THEATRE

FRIBOURG - A FLOURISHING CENTRE OF CULTURE

When it comes to population size (300,000 residents), the canton of Fribourg is on a par with Nice (France), Karlsruhe (Germany) and Bari (Italy). When it comes to cultural life, however, Fribourg is in a different league to its European counterparts. For proof, you need look no further than the impressive number of theatres dotted across the region. For lovers of theatre and other performing arts, the canton of Fribourg has much to offer. Take the Équilibre auditorium (see photograph) in Fribourg city centre, for example. While not everyone appreciates its avant-gardist architecture, the 700-seat auditorium successfully draws in the crowds with its diverse and inclusive programme, ranging from theatre, dance and concerts, right up to

contemporary circus and even opera. As Laurent Bourgknecht, the Administrative Director, explains, "Our theatre is a state-of-the-art and incredibly flexible performance facility. Performing arts professionals, from Switzerland and elsewhere, frequently come to us in search of inspiration." Fribourg can rightly be proud of Équilibre. For a city this size, the theatre has enjoyed incredible success."

For theatre-goers who prefer a more intimate setting, there is L'Arbanel, in Treyvaux. According to Dominique Rapilly, a member of the booking team, "The artists and audience who come here appreciate its welcoming and special atmosphere. Our theatre, with its wooden beams and red bricks, is a real beauty!" Like the Théâtre des Osses and Nuithonie,

in Greater Fribourg, L'Arbanel is renowned far and wide for the quality of its productions. Further south, in the heart of verdant Gruyère, is the 750-seat CO2, the largest auditorium in the canton. It offers an events calendar that includes headline acts as well as novel, new talent. "Unlike other theatres, we are not primarily in the business of developing our own productions, though it does happen from time to time", explains Dominique Rime, head booker at CO2. No matter, the public is clearly spoilt for choice!

SYSTEM ENVIED HE WORLD OVER





The close and excellent cooperation that exists between the State and the business sector helps safeguard the quality of the basic vocational education and training dispensed in Switzerland", notes Jean-Nicolas Aebischer. This successful working relationship is embodied in the Swiss "dual" VET system, which combines classes at a vocational college and on-the-job training in a company. Once they have completed their compulsory education, young people can choose between one of two routes: attendance at an upper-secondary school (with a path to university) or an apprenticeship. Students who pass the Federal Vocational Baccalaureate can continue their education at a University of Applied Sciences (UAS). Traditional universities and UAS are different-but-equivalent institutions. They are separated by a "permeable membrane" that allows talented young students to move from one to the other via a range of one-year preparatory courses (see eBook). In summary, the Director of the Fribourg School of Engineering and Architecture declares, "Thanks to its upper-secondary schools and traditional universities, coupled with a great many training companies, VET colleges and four Universities of Applied Sciences, the canton of Fribourg is a fine example of the extensive opportunities that are open to talented young people."


DIALOGUE AND COOPERATION

In Switzerland, three levels of government share power: the Confederation, the cantons and the municipalities. The canton of Fribourg is divided into 137 municipalities, all of which exercise control in a range of areas, including education, social protection, energy, land-use planning and taxation. Yet, they also liaise with the cantonal government as a matter of course. "We work closely with the canton on matters like commercial or industrial zoning and road infrastructure projects. The relationship between the canton and the municipalities

is a complementary one", explains Nicole Schwab, Mayor of Kerzers (population: 5,000). She is also quick to stress the advantages of such political decentralisation and the close working ties between the cantonal and municipal governments, "It helps that we don't see people only at meetings but that our paths cross at informal social gatherings, too."

SWISS POLITICAL SYSTEM

LEGITIMACY AND STABILITY THE MAGIC FORMULA

"Switzerland's political system has three main distinguishing features: semi-direct democracy, federalism and ironclad stability." Dominique de Buman, who has been elected President of the National Council for 2018, stresses the importance of citizen participation in political affairs, "The fact that the people are called on to express their opinion during referendums and to elect their political leaders bolsters the legitimacy of our institutions", explains the Fribourg parliamentarian. As for referendum and initiative rights, which allow the electorate to voice its disagreement with parliament or to put draft legislation to the vote, "they ensure public and transparent debate."

For the Christian Democrat, the stability of the Swiss political system "is primarily down to two factors: proportional representation, which means that the winning candidates adequately reflect voters' preferences, and a high degree of public satisfaction. It stands to reason, therefore, that when you are content with how things are, you don't feel the need to cause a political tsunami." According to de Buman, this high level of

contentment is due to "the remarkable balance that exists between social justice and favourable economic conditions". One of the positive outcomes of this political stability is that "leaders are actively and heavily involved in priority policy areas (e.g. education) on which the prosperity of our country depends."

The Fribourg politician also extols the virtues of federalism "as a means of catering to the aspirations of as many taxpaying citizens as possible." It is a known fact that "political leanings vary from one region to the next, particularly when they do not share the same language." Thanks to decentralisation and the subsidiarity principle, which is designed to ensure that decisions are made efficiently and as close as possible to the citizen, "each region can prioritise those points they consider crucial. This leads us back to the idea of legitimacy and satisfaction, and therefore finishing off where we had started!"

TECHNOLOGY CLUSTERS

FRIBOURG - A HUB FOR INNOVATION

Investing heavily in innovation and activities with high added value is the strategy shared and pursued by businesses, academia and policymakers in Fribourg. The canton already has three technology clusters which offer their cutting-edge infrastructure and services to start-ups and high-tech firms.

BLUEFACTORY



The grand opening of the "Blue Hall" in 2015 was an important milestone in blueFACTORY's nascent history.

The innovation guarter blueFACTORY, on the site of the former Cardinal brewery in Fribourg's city centre, is home to around 30 start-ups, innovative companies and technology platforms (public-private partnerships). Eventually, the rapidly growing and low-carbon quarter will house a mix of business, services, culture, housing, green spaces and car-free areas. As the Managing Director, Philippe Jemmely, explains: "blueFACTORY is jointly run by the city and canton of Fribourg, and is a member of Switzerland Innovation, a national innovation network spread over five sites nationwide", adding "By fostering synergies with Fribourg's higher education providers, blueFACTORY acts as a catalyst and develops, above all, specialised expertise in areas like buildings of the future, biopharma and mobility (hydrogen storage, materials, smart and secure systems). However, industrialisation, in the narrow sense of the term, is not the name of the game here."

LE VIVIER

In addition to its modern infrastructure, which is adapted to its occupants' needs, Le Vivier promotes industrial synergies and operates in its own wholly unique environment.

PROMOTING BUSINESS GROWTH, THE FRIBOURG WAY

The diversity and density of Fribourg's business landscape comes as no surprise to Denis Galley. For the member of the governing board of the Fribourg Cantonal Bank (BCF), the canton has a great deal to offer companies looking to set up business in the region. "The canton has come up with an outstanding range of instruments designed to support start-ups and SMEs. They include Fri Up, the official support service for new businesses, Seed Capital Fribourg, Capital Risque Fribourg SA, and the Fribourg section of the SME Guarantee Cooperative for Western Switzerland (CRC PME). Each can be brought in at different levels depending on the stage of development that the company is at." Take Capital Risque Fribourg SA, for example. With a share capital of CHF 7.5 million – funded in part by the BCF – it provides financial support to innovative companies that are either starting out or looking to expand their operations. In other words,

companies that will create jobs in the canton. Supporting and guiding companies is written into the bank's DNA: "The Fribourg Cantonal Bank Act stipulates that part of the Bank's mission is to contribute to the growth of the cantonal economy." As well as the BCF's attractive credit solutions, entrepreneurs benefit from Fribourg's proactive policy to attract business investment to the canton. Measures include making it easier for companies to acquire land and premises, assisting them with the relevant administrative formalities, and helping them find suitable partners like the BCF.

HEALTHCARE SYSTEM

WORLD-BEATING HEALTHCARE



The cantonal hospital has a 120-strong A&E team that are on hand to treat patients at any time of the day or night.

"Switzerland has one of the best health systems in the world", declares Anne-Claude Demierre, quickly pointing out that international studies have also reached the same conclusion. According to the Cantonal Minister of Health and Social Affairs, "Health is a top policy priority" and "the country allocates 10% of its GDP to health spending", which puts it well above the OECD average. Furthermore, Switzerland, where basic health insurance is mandatory for all, has the second-highest density of physicians – 3.8 for every 1000 inhabitants - among OECD countries. All medical personnel in Switzerland, including physicians, have received "a recognised and first-rate education". In this regard, the canton of Fribourg is no exception. The canton "provides wide-ranging medical services, ensuring that its residents receive the treatment they need close to their home." In addition to the bilingual Fribourg Cantonal Hospital (HFR), which is spread over five sites, the canton boasts a solid network of mental healthcare providers, as well as home help and home care services, general and specialist medical practices, and two private clinics.

SWISS EMPLOYMENT LAW

LIBERALISM AND INTEGRATION

"Swiss employment law has the reputation of being liberal", explains Basile Cardinaux, Chair of Social Insurance and Employment Law at the University of Fribourg. How does this liberalism manifest itself? "The absence of a minimum wage and relatively weak protection against dismissal." According to Cardinaux, this lack of protection has certain advantages for employers in Switzerland and, by extension the canton of Fribourg, "Firms can go on hiring sprees when business is booming", and be completely

confident in the knowledge that they can terminate the employment contract fairly quickly should business take a downturn. Added to this is the low unemployment rate "and a highly permeable" Swiss labour market. No-one is excluded, whether they are young, mothers or non-Swiss nationals. "It's a real integration machine!"

SPOTTING THE NEXT BIG THING (1)



Many international and local legends – here, Fribourg musician and song-writer, Gustav – have graced the stage of the mythical Fri-Son rock club.

For a canton the size of Fribourg, the number of music venues it has is pretty staggering. To begin with, there is the legendary rock club, Fri-Son. Over the last 35 years, this repurposed warehouse, with its awesome exterior murals created by a group of talented graffiti artists, has become a testament to the live music scene, and is one of the biggest concert venues in Switzerland. "Alternative music is in the club's DNA", explains Émilien Rossier, Fri-Son's General Secretary. "We're constantly on the look-out for undiscovered talent." Indeed, the club's bookers have a proven track record for talent-spotting: legendary bands like Nirvana (see eBook), the Beastie Boys, Motörhead, Muse and even Placebo, as well as singers such as Stromae, had yet to make it really

big when they performed at Fri-Son. As well as concerts, the club hosts an eclectic range of special events, including cutting-edge DJ sets, roller discos, and table-tennis tournaments. Companies can also hire the club for private parties.

Fribourg caters to jazz buffs, too. The La Spirale cellar club in Fribourg's historic Old Town is renowned as a purveyor of extraordinary blue note performances, but Gilles Dupuis, the club's booking agent, is quick to point out that the venue also embraces other musical genres, particularly soul, funk, blues, world music and French chanson. While La Spirale is primarily a showcase for fresh talent, quite a few well-established stars – Dave Holland, Richard Galliano and Mike Stern, to name but a few – have

graced the club's intimate stage. The canton is also home to Bad Bonn, a live music venue that can only be described as sui generis (one of a kind)! Those lucky enough to find it – there is a reason why its strapline is "Where the hell is Bad Bonn?" – will discover a club like no other and a programme packed full of surprises. "We are a real backcountry rock club", proudly proclaims Patrick Boschung, the club's administrator. Also, the annual springtime Bad Bonn Kilbi is considered to be one of the best festivals in Switzerland.

The main reason why Maxwell Technologies chose to base its operations in Rossens, a village in the heart of rural Fribourg, was its direct motorway access. "This was a crucial factor because we export our CONDIS® high-voltage capacitors around the globe", explains Patrick Gaillard, High Voltage Business Development & Marketing Manager. Founded in Fribourg in 1903 (see eBook), the company, which is in Californian hands since 2003, operates in a high value-added niche market, and counts industry giants like ABB, GE and Siemens among its customers.

Maxwell Technologies is currently expanding its Fribourg plant. "We benefitted from the incredible support of the authorities and the Fribourg Development Agency." However, as Gaillard points out, it was not about receiving preferential treatment but rather receiving valuable guidance when it came to applying for building permits, for example. Another reason for choosing Rossens was its proximity to talent pools like the Fribourg School of Engineering and Architecture and the Ecole polytechnique fédérale de Lausanne (EPFL), one of the most acclaimed universities in the world.

WHEN FIRST-RATE TALENT COMES FROM FARTHER AFIELD

When companies want to hire highly-specialised executives and staff, they are sometimes compelled to look outside Switzerland, and even beyond Europe; headhunting IT experts from India or CEOs from North America, for example. In such instances, they can call on the Cantonal Population and Migration Office (SPoMi) for assistance. As Thierry Ruffieux, head of the Foreign Labour Section of SPoMi, explains, "The HR departments of companies based in the canton contact us when they need to organise residence permits for some of their future employees.

We help them through the process and, depending on the state of the labour market at that time, we can even grant exemptions." The SPoMi, which is in charge of implementing legislation governing the employment of foreign nationals, also works with the Fribourg Development Agency to help link up employers with potential foreign investors and, in more recent times, with asylum seekers looking for paid work as a pathway to integration.


